In order to render more pleasurable the act from the Opera of La Favorita, we give a resume of the plot.

That of Trovatore is so well known it is not deemed necessary to produce it here.

"Fernando, in a Convent, has seen and loved Leonora, whom he does not know to be the 'maitresse du roi.' He leaves the Convent, becomes an officer, through Leonora's interest, in one of the royal regiments, and in battle saves the King Alfonso's life.

"Fernando is raised to the highest honors, and asks, as the last and highest reward, the hand of Leonora. The King finding his 'maitresse' had betrayed him, revenges himself by granting the request of Fernando.

"The marriage ceremony is performed, and afterwards scoffed at by the courtiers. Fernando finds he has been dishonored, and repudiating his wife, retires once more to a Convent. To this place Leonora comes, sick and dying, to ask pardon of Fernando, who at first repulses, but finally overcome by her penitence and his love, he forgives her, and she dies in his arms."
