—On Wednesday the Cathedral choir, with a few guests, will make a visit to Long Pond and Troubridge. They have chartered the steamboat Rochester for the trip. On returning in the afternoon, dinner will be taken at the Spencer House.

—A meeting of citizens was held in the Fifteenth Ward Saturday night to discuss the question of a site for the new school, No. 21, to be constructed in the ward. Recke, of 18 Howard street. Mr. Recke was severely but not fatally injured. Dr. White attended him.

—In referring to the new steamer "Flower City," it was said she was to be launched this week. The vessel is almost completed and will be placed in commission in a short time.

—The horses were selling at three cents a pound when I left this morning.
